George Grummett gave a short history of Probud:

Probud was started in England in 1966 and there are now 1200 Probud Clubs in England; there are 1400 Clubs in Australia and New Zealand, there are also Clubs in Holland and Belgium. The first Club was formed in Canada in 1987 and there are now 26 clubs in Canada with over 2000 members. It is estimated that there are over 1/4 million members worldwide.

It was resolved to form the Probud Club of Burlington Lakeshore on a motion by Ray Partridge and Harry Shewchuck, carried.

Moved by Jess Humphries, seconded by Steve Pustai that all applications for Founding Membership be accepted, carried.

Moved by Lindsay Leslie, seconded by Harry Bowers that the Constitution distributed at the meeting be adopted as an interim Constitution, carried.

On a motion by Jess Humphries, seconded by Jack Reble that steering committee consist of Bob Faulds, Bruce Harrop, Ron Lake, Bill Stevenson, and Max Tuck with Ron Lake being the interim President and Bob Faulds being the interim Vice-President. Motion was carried.

Moved by Bill Sims, seconded by Ron Forbes and carried that the regular meetings be held on the second Monday of each month at 10.am. in the Lakeshore Room of the Cultural Centre.

It was also agreed by show of hands that the fees for the time being would be: initiation \$25, annually dues \$25.

The speaker for the meeting in March will be Garry Hutton of the Halton Region Conservation.
