Guest Speaker - Ken McCoogan



Last autumn, Ken
McGoogan published his
15th book, Flight of the
Highlanders, The Making of
Canada -- the third in a
series that includes How the
Scots Invented
Canada and Celtic
Lightning. All three have
garnered rave reviews. In

2017, Ken published Dead Reckoning: The Untold Story of the Northwest Passage. That book builds on his four earlier acclaimed narratives about Arctic exploration: Fatal Passage, Ancient Mariner, Lady Franklin's Revenge, and Race to the Polar Sea. These works earned him the Writers' Trust of Canada Biography Prize, the Canadian Authors' Association History Award, the UBC Medal for Canadian Biography, the Pierre Berton Award for History, and an American Christopher Award for "a work of artistic excellence that affirms the highest values of the human spirit." Ken's other books include the novel Kerouac's Ghost and 50 Canadians Who Changed the World.

Before moving mainly to books, Ken worked as a journalist for two decades (Toronto Star, Montreal Star, Calgary Herald). He has a bachelor's degree in journalism from Toronto's Ryerson University and a master's degree in creative writing from the University of British Columbia. He has taught writing for a dozen years, and in 2010 won an award for teaching excellence from the University of Toronto. Ken made a cameo appearance in the docudrama based on his book Fatal Passage. He served as chair of the Public Lending Right Commission and teaches in the low-residency master's program in Creative Nonfiction at the University of King's College in Halifax.

First, some information on a new event offering:

Ontario Christian Gleaners, located just south of Cambridge on highway 8, was established in 2008 as a registered charity that is both volunteer and donor driven. It provides Relief Organizations with vegetable mixes and fruit snacks that are versatile and can be shipped anywhere in the world.

Weekday mornings an average of 65 volunteers arrive early to trim some 2500 kg of donated fresh produce. The trimmed product is diced (in a machine that needs to be seen to be believed) dried and packaged. On a weekly basis, the operation provides ingredients for some 150,000 nutritious meals.

We have booked a tour for the morning of Thursday, June 4th. The tour begins at 10:30 and lasts about 45min, viewing all aspects of the operation. Afterwards there is a short video and time for questions. Then we will have a light lunch at a nearby restaurant. Cost has yet to firmed up, but will be no more than \$30 including donation and lunch.

Before proceeding further with this event, the committee would like to confirm there is sufficient interest. If you are interested, please sign the sheet at the events table. This does not commit you to attend. We are looking for some 16 - 24 participants. Details will be announced at the April Meeting.

For many years member David Page has served as the Club's accountant. Understandably, after so many years of service David has chosen to "opt" out of this role. We thank David for all his past service to the Club.



Being an Advocate for your Health Osteoarthritis

Summary Notes

- Osteoarthritis is not just wear & tear but a dysfunction of the joints ability to repair
- Wearing down of cartilage and synovial fluid, leading to stiffness and pain
- Usually affects the fingers, big toe, thumb, knee, hip back or neck and can be asymmetrical
- Reduced mobility leads to increase in heart disease and diabetes
- Movement is key even if it hurts, that is what we take the pain killers for
- Weight loss can help -as little as 5% can make a big difference -10lbs weight loss is like 40lbs off your knee
- Medication options Topical is first choice
- When choosing oral medication always check with your pharmacist if it is appropriate for you and what is the right dose.
- Ask our home health care specialist about what tools are available for you
- Remember to always go to your physician prepared with questions and take notes.
- Take advantage of an annual MedsCheck with your pharmacist
- Update your adult vaccines; especially for pneumonia and shingles and the annual flu shot. The high potency flu vaccine is more effective for people over the age of 65 and does not have more side effects than the regular potency flu shot. It is only distributed through your family physician's office.
