Guest Speaker - Derek Muir



The presence of chemical contaminants in northern Canada has been an ongoing concern for human health and top predator wildlife such as polar bears, for the past 40 years or more. Beginning in the 1980s it was recognized that long range transport of pollutants in the atmosphere was delivering chemicals such as PCBs and DDT to remote regions and that the Inuit were more highly exposed to these chemicals than southern Canadians due to their traditional diet which included marine mammals. In fact, our new Governor General, Mary Simon, who led the Inuit Circumpolar Council in the 1980s, was one of the first leaders to call for international action to reduce this pollution. National and international action has successfully reduced levels of some chemicals, however, concern remains because many substances that are in wide use also undergo atmospheric and oceanic transport from urban/ industrial regions to the Arctic. Identifying these chemicals, deciding whether they are a threat to humans or wildlife, and regulating them globally, remains a challenge. A new aspect of this issue is the impact of climate warming. The average annual temperatures across the Canadian Arctic have increased by 2 to 3 °C since the 1980s. Melting glaciers and permafrost in a

warming Arctic have shown to be releasing mercury and PCBs that were deposited from the atmosphere over the past century. The marine environment is also changing with reduced sea ice cover leading to species from sub-Arctic latitudes moving north. This presentation will review some of the past successes and current issues that demonstrate how the Arctic is a sentinel for global change related to climate and chemical contamination.

Derek Muir is a Senior Research Scientist with Environment & Climate Change and holds adjunct professor positions in the School of Environmental Sciences, University of Guelph, and in the Dept of Chemistry at University of Toronto. He leads an environmental chemistry group based at Canada Centre for Inland Waters in Burlington, that studies sources, fate and bioaccumulation of contaminants with a focus on persistent organic pollutants and mercury in the Arctic. Derek was elected to the Academy of Sciences of the Royal Society of Canada in 2003 and received the W. Garfield Weston Family Prize for Lifetime Achievement in Northern Research in 2018.
