She started her career as a uniform patrol officer in Burlington where she spent 9 years in patrol before moving over to the investigative side of policing.

Allison was a member of the Child Abuse & Sexual Assault Bureau and Intimate Partner Violence Unit where she also worked on Human Trafficking and Homicide investigations. After spending 12 years in investigative portfolios, Allison decided she wanted a change and entered into a community policing role. Allison was a community officer in Burlington and recently was transferred to police headquarters in Oakville where she is a member of the Older Adults



Investigative Team as the Older Adult Support Officer. In her current role, Allison is a resource officer who provides outreach, connections to supports and community services for older adults in Halton Region. She works in partnership with uniform patrol officers, investigators, social workers, as well as community agencies with the goal of connecting older adults to supports and services.

On a personal note, Allison is a strong advocate for the Special Olympics community and is the organizer of the Halton Regional Police - Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR) in support of Special Olympics athletes.

On Feb. 14, the local YMCA hosted a Seniors Active Living Fair, one of several events set up through the Ontario Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility across the province.

Dozens of non-profit groups and retirement residences had tables displaying different groups and activities that might be of interest to seniors.

Our Probus club, along with the Men's Probus Club of Burlington, staffed an information table throughout the day to explain to the 150 attendees what Probus is and why other seniors might be interested in joining.

The event also held a couple of speakers – one on 'Blue Zones' around the world (hotspots where a large number of residents live to be 100 years or older), and professor Anthony Levinson speaking about McMaster University's Health Sciences department and the study of dementia.

Though the topic is a bit concerning, Dr. Levinson pointed to several actions seniors can take to slow down or even avoid dementia in coming years. Perhaps our speakers group might approach Dr. Levinson to speak to an upcoming meeting.
